## Civilian Service Rifle (CSR)

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### CSR at HPR&PC (as at 31Jan 2026):

CSR at HPR&PC is run once a month on a Saturday, usually mid month, on the 100 yard range, normally from 1000hrs until the seasonal range closing time (around 1530hrs).

CSR at HPR&PC is based on the "NRA Urban Match" adapted to be compliant with the range safety certificate. It is a rifle, Range Officer (RO) controlled, timed, flowing advance to contact, turning target discipline shot "shoulder to shoulder" at standard NRA targets, with decreasing engagement distance from different positions. For example: 100 yards standing supported (Fig11); then 75 yards kneeling around cover (Fig11); then 50 yards standing / kneeling (Fig14 Window); then 25 yards standing (Fig14 Window) .

Celeritas et Diligentia: The challenge is to achieve the correct number of accurate shots on the prescribed target, from the prescribed position, before the target turns away.



### Equipment:

For CSR at HPR&PC most shooters use magazine fed (10rd capacity minimum) 22LR semi auto, 22LR bolt action, 9x19mm or 300 Blackout straight pull rifles, with optic sights. Please note, we can safely accommodate any range safety certificate compliant rifle +/- ammo combination with iron sights or optic sights, adapting the course of fire for lesser capacity rifles. Full webbing kit is optional, as you may receive style points (and some friendly banter).





# What do you do? :

A couple of CSR range commands may be new to some shooters, these are:

“watch-out” :— targets are about to turn, the signal to proceed to the next stage of the shoot

“make safe” :— empty chamber, bolt forward, safety catch engaged, loaded magazine inserted  
...please note, these are akin to “stand-by” and “load option-2” in IPSC shooting.

Starting from the 100 yard firing point with rifles “made safe” the targets are turned to face the shooter and the first timed target is engaged with 10 rounds from a standing supported position. After the prescribed time, the targets turn away. The RO checks that all chambers are empty and then all rifles are “made safe”.



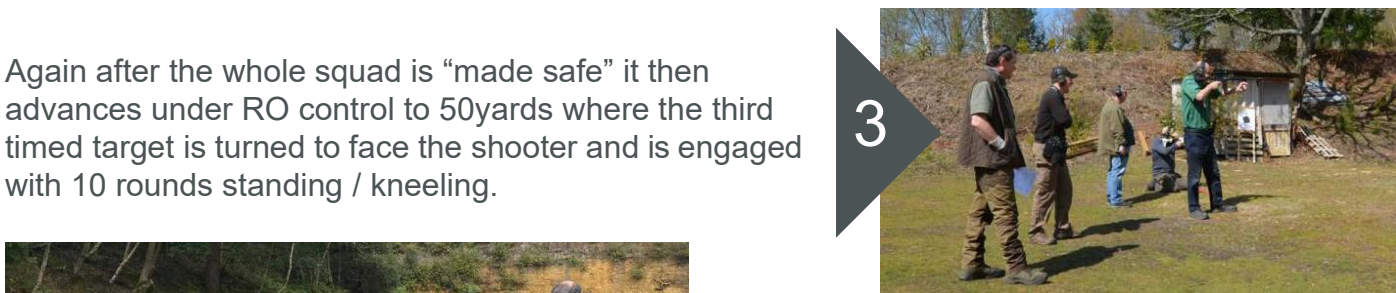
Only after the whole squad is “made safe”, the squad under RO control then advances to 75yards where the second timed target is turned to face the shooter and is engaged with 10 rounds kneeling around cover.



Again after the whole squad is “made safe” it then advances under RO control to 50yards where the third timed target is turned to face the shooter and is engaged with 10 rounds standing / kneeling.



Then the whole squad is “made safe” and under RO control advances to 25yards where the fourth timed target is turned to face the shooter and is engaged with 10 rounds standing. The RO then clears all the rifles which are then “flagged” and the scoring / excuse generation can begin.

Clearing away is simple, just pick up brass, a small amount of furniture to be returned to the 100yard firing point, with the targets, control cables and battery returned to the maintenance shed.

CSR can be shot as a team event with a bolt-action and semi-auto in a ‘squad’, the annual R.J. “Helicopter and Pick-up” challenge is one such event, as is the Firing Solutions “Balti” challenge.
